This Reading List is going to help your child discover books they love!

Children can benefit tremendously by being read to aloud. Studies show that children who are read to aloud are more likely to do better in school both academically and socially. Reading together for pleasure throughout primary school (right up to Y6 and beyond!) is vital to develop and encourage your child. Just ten minutes a day can make a huge difference.

When we read often, and with enthusiasm, just for the sheer fun of it, we lay foundations that last for life. Almost by osmosis we internalize the essential skills of spelling, grammar and vocabulary. We learn to express ourselves verbally and in writing. We learn to interpret and potentially change our world.

Reading for pleasure is even more important than social class in determining your child's academic success (The Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development)

This list includes some classics from the 100 Best books as recommended by The Book Trust, but it also includes books recommended by the children of St Mary's. We hope your child loves these books too, but if they don't try another book.



### How to use your child's 'Reading Record' book:

This book should be used to build up a picture of your child as a reader. It should also be thought of as a written conversation between you and your child's class teacher. After hearing your child read, you should write a comment about how your child read. Sometimes your child may want to add their own comment or draw a face to show how much they liked the book.


Reading ages are very approximate. Your child may enjoy books above or below the suggested reading age – it does not matter as long as they enjoy what they read. If your child struggles to read more than 5 words per page then they may not be ready to read that book alone just yet, and they will need your support. You may also want to consider your child's emotional and social maturity when deciding on the appropriateness of the book.

Each Peach Pear Plum Reading Age 4+ This classic book from author and illustrator team Janet and Allan Ahlberg is a real favourite with families.







### Flour Babies Reading age 9+
